With a table set up in the courtyard of her Cathedrai City Cove home, Venturini will school students on every piece of silverware, glass and plate in the setting and when to use H

"If you see a spoon at the top of the plate, then it's a good sign that you may be having something soft like los cream or pudding for dessert." Venturini said.

Venturini's piece settings are one glass short of what guests would see at a state dinner, ensuring students will be prepared for any type of formal meal.

She also will work with students on the proper way to introduce someone, network and address dignitaries.

Venturini said, many children today are only learning the basics of etiquette — no elbows on the table, chew with the mouth closed, use a fork and not fingers. A few are learning even less than the basics, she added.

Naomi Torre, a certified etiquette consultant with The Etiquette School of Monarch Beach, said she agrees with Venturini that bad manners are becoming more of the norm.

"Our outure is experiencing a downward direction toward crudeness and rudeness," she said. "Like learning how to swim, humans have to be taught how to think of others first. Parenting is not about showering one's offspring with objects of instant grafification but rather giving a standard of what is and what is not appealing when dealing with others."

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
